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BUILDING POSITIVE RELATIONS (£1,192,556.55):

This part of the Action Plan will support five projects including an inter-linkage programme, which will create local history and cultural trails and a twinning programme for sports clubs.

Key output: Local action plans that result in meaningful, purposeful and sustained contact between persons from different communities: 1

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE (£600,987.97):

This part of the Action Plan will support six initiatives including a programme where children and young people will engage in peace and reconciliation themed activities, incorporating music, arts, multi-media, drama and history.

Key Output: Number of participants aged 0-24 completing approved programmes that develop their soft skills and a respect for diversity: 950

SHARED SPACES AND SERVICES (£1,060,087.32):

This part of the Action Plan will support four initiatives including a re-imagining programme for existing shared spaces that will serve to enhance community cohesion. This programme aims to provide up to 25 community groups/ organisations with the opportunity to access investment in programmes that will encourage and promote the use of existing spaces on a shared basis.

Key Output: Local initiatives that facilitate the sustained usage on a shared basis of public areas/buildings: 1
