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Newry, Mourne and Down District Council Local Authority Plan will support a number of locally-based projects and initiatives that will promote positive relations between people from different communities and backgrounds, develop their soft skills and a respect for diversity and facilitate the sustained usage on a shared basis of public areas/buildings.

The Action Plan will focus on three key areas: Children and Young People, Shared Spaces and services, and Building Positive Relations.

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CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE (£999,203.40):

Eight projects have been approved under this theme including: a personal development programme for children which will work to develop social, emotional and soft skills of 4-9 year olds through age appropriate activities, as well as a shared history and cultural programme for young people, which will explore local areas/sites; shared Christian heritage; different faiths and cultural roots; and hate crime.

Key Output: Number of participants aged 0 – 24 completing approved programmes that develop their soft skills and a respect for diversity: 1,651

SHARED SPACES AND SERVICES (£1,688,257.32):

12 projects have been approved under this theme including a number of legacy programmes for ex-military sites including Ballykinlar; Forkhill; Bessbrook; Ballyhornan and Ballynahinch. This project will see engagement at both a local and district level by opening up spaces for learning which previously were connected to the historical back drop of the conflict in Northern Ireland.

Key Output: Local action plans that result in meaningful, purposeful and sustained contact between persons from different communities: 1

BUILDING POSITIVE RELATIONS (£2,065,819.30):

Nine projects have been approved under this theme including an ethnic minority cultural programme which aims to engage groups and individuals in positive learning to dispel myths and perceptions of the 'other' community; and cross-community and inter-cultural workshops, which will lead to inclusive events organised by the community.

Key Output : Local initiatives that facilitate the sustained usage on a shared basis of public areas/buildings: 1
