Project Case Study: Theatre Peace Building Academy

This ambitious project will use theatre as a tool to explore community relations issues in a safe and accessible environment. People and communities most affected by the conflict/troubles are the main beneficiaries. The project is recruiting eight local artists and four internationally celebrated artists with significant experience of utilising arts activity in areas of conflict and social breakdown. An estimated 76 cross-community participants will be reached delivering approximately 2,200 hours of collaborative working time.

Project Case Study: Theatre Peace Building Academy

In this project theatre and the creative arts are implemented as tools to explore community relations issues, and generate discussion on the legacy of the conflict/troubles in a safe and accessible environment, promoting healing and reconciliation in a liberating, meaningful and transformative way.

Key Project Outputs:

- Recruit eight local artists & a range of internationally based artists, with significant experience of utilising arts activity in conflict areas of social breakdown throughout the world.
- Engage 76 cross-community participants.
- Deliver four touring Multi Media Theatre productions and eight non-touring Multi Media Theatre productions (through local projects).
- Secure audiences of approximately 4,000 people.
